PACK RECOGNITION

At Cedar Elementary, we follow our PACK matrix of being problem solvers, accountable and aware of our actions, cooperative and kind. Students are recognized weekly on our Friday announcements and we add to our PACK chain that is growing in the hall by the office.

At home, families are encouraged to talk about kind behaviours and how to act appropriately in different settings. Siblings may wrestle at home but this is not appropriate for the schoolyard. We have noticed an increase in aggressive behaviours on our yard and are working to promote actions that are kind and cooperative. You can help us by talking about ways to problem solve peacefully at home and not using physical actions. Taking responsibility for our actions is a big part of becoming a responsible citizen. A number of students are using inappropriate language as well in their play. Again, the schoolyard is not the place for this and we appreciate your help in talking to your children about these issues.

ANTI-BULLYING OR PINK SHIRT DAY

Pink Shirt Day is about working together to prevent or stop bullying by celebrating people's differences and promoting positive relationships. An annual event, celebrated in many countries around the world, Pink Shirt Day encourages people to talk about bullying and take action against it.

Pink Shirt Day began in Nova Scotia in 2007. A group of students decided to defend a student who was bullied for wearing a pink shirt. In a show of solidarity, many of his peers turned up to school the next day wearing pink shirts, and Pink Shirt Day was born. By wearing a pink shirt, people identify themselves as an ally. The pink shirt is a way of showing those being bullied that there are many people around who care.

Please wear pink on that day - it might be a t-shirt from another year or just something pink. We need to use our problem solving skills to stop bullying and mean behaviour so wearing pink reminds us to do that every day.

Not all negative behaviours are bullying, however, and we need to aware if the actions are mean behaviours, peer conflict or bullying. It is important to teach and model ways to intervene and speak up - it is important to tell an adult in any situation where a child does not feel safe.



TRAFFIC SAFETY

There are no changes to our traffic challenges at Cedar Elementary. Please ensure you are exercising extreme caution at all times in the parking lot and on the road. Congestion at peak times (arrival, dismissal) means there are many children out and about. Without sidewalks, our students are walking on the side of narrow roads. Please be extra vigilant when pulling in, backing out or driving through. Please do not park a vehicle in the bus area, but you can use it for drop off and pick up when there are not busses. Of course, cars should not be in this area for more than a quick drop off or pick up. The back unpaved parking lot is designated staff parking and not conducive to dropping off as the road is not really wide enough for two vehicles. Also remember there is no parking in designated handicapped parking unless you have a valid handicap sign. Please do what you can to help out with our congestion and keep our area safe for our students and families.
