# STUDENT LEARNING SURVEY

The Student Learning Survey is an annual province-wide census of Grades 4, 7, 10 and 12 students, their parents and staff in public schools. The questions were developed with input from partner groups, teachers and experts in educational measurement and special education. It usually takes about 10 minutes to complete the required survey questions.

Students in grades 4 and 7 will fill out the survey at school by the end of the month. Please take a few minutes to log in to the website below and give your feedback. We appreciate all input. The survey is open until May 3<sup>rd</sup>.

#### SCHOOL TRACK MEET

Our school track meet will be held at the Rotary Bowl on Monday, April 29. Students in grades 3-7 sign up for various events and compete on that day. Top finishers qualify to attend the zone meet on May 22. In order for this event to run smoothly, we require a number of parent valunteers

There will be more than one adult at a station, so even if you have never helped out before, you can come and learn and provide needed support. We need timers for our running events and volunteers for the field events. This is a great way to see your child in action at the track meet and help the school at the same time. ### MEASLES IMMUNIZATION

The Province of British Columbia is launching a measles immunization catch-up program to help B.C. families ensure their children are protected from measles. The program will run from April through June 2019, with a goal of immunizing as many of the under immunized school aged children as possible by the end of the school year. Immunization consent packages will be sent home for students in kindergarten to grade 4 who are behind on their immunizations. Students will be offered immunizations at a public health office or a school-based immunization clinic with the consent of a parent, quardian or representative. Parent(s), quardians or representatives will be required to accompany students to the public health immunization appointment or school based immunization clinic. Students who are up to date on their immunizations will receive a record of immunization. Please keep this record to provide to your child's school this fall.

First Nations children who receive health services in their communities may be able to access immunization records and services at their Community Health Centers.

Please contact the local Health Unit at 250-755-3388 and ask to speak with a Public Health Nurse if you have any questions.

Nanaimo/Ladysmith/Gabriola Public Health is currently organizing immunization clinics for under immunized school aged children. Please watch for further information regarding the dates and locations of these clinics.

#### TOYS AT SCHOOL

Sometimes students - especially in the younger grades - like to bring toys or special items to school. Often this is for sharing time or show and tell. If your child brings toys to play with outside, the school will not be responsible for loss or damage to these items so care needs to be taken with putting them away securely and paying attention to them outside.

# CELL PHONES & OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES

As technology continues to advance, we are seeing students at schools with cell phones, game systems, iPods, digital cameras etc. If your child has any of these at school, please remind him/her that they are for after school and are to be turned off and in the backpack/locker throughout the school day. Any phones that are outside will be taken and held in the office until the end of the day. In particular, cell phones are not to be used outside at any time during the school day. If a student needs to use the phone for emergency issues, the school phone is accessible with permission from a staff member. The other issue around technology that has become increasingly common at schools is the use of digital or cell phone cameras. For privacy issues, as well as personal safety issues, we ask that students do not bring or use personal cameras at school. Also, the school will not be responsible for loss or damage to these items so care needs to be taken with putting them away securely. If a student needs to use the phone during the day, the student phone is available in the office area. If a parent needs to contact a student in an emergency, please call the office and we will pass on the message. Thank you for your support.
