On November 28, 2018, the Board of Education agreed to update the district's Strategic Plan. PACK RECOGNITION

Our school goal is for students to develop social responsibility: to contribute positively to the school community, society, and the environment; to resolve problems peacefully; to empathize with others and appreciate their perspectives; and to create and maintain healthy relationships. Learning involves recognizing the consequences of one's actions.

At Cedar Elementary, we follow our PACK matrix of being P-problem solvers, A-accountable and aware of our actions, C-cooperative and K-kind. We teach these behaviours in the classroom and students self assess these core competencies. Daily reminders are given on the announcements of what these actions should look like. Students are recognized weekly for making the right choices on our Friday announcements and we add to our PACK chain that is growing in the hall by the office. Even though these issues are addressed in classes, as a school and to individuals, aggressive behaviours on our yard continue. When many students are asked to stop a behaviour, they reply that they are "just having fun" or "it's ok, I told them they could do that". These aggressive behaviours are not fun and the same students who are laughing at one point often are upset and asking for help a few minutes later because they are hurt. Staff are active every recess and wear safety vests to be visible. If your child is having an issue, please remind them to talk to an adult outside so issues can be dealt with right away.

But we need your help ...

At home, families are encouraged to talk about kind behaviours and how to act appropriately in different settings. Siblings may roughhouse at home but this is not appropriate for the schoolyard. We are working to promote actions that are kind and cooperative. You can help us by talking about ways to problem solve peacefully at home and not using physical actions. Taking responsibility for our actions is a big part of becoming a responsible citizen. A number of students are using inappropriate language as well in their play. Again, the schoolyard is not the place for this and we appreciate your help in talking to your children about these issues.

How will we know we have made a difference?

- Students working together to solve problems with words, not actions and with limited adult assistance
- Students participating in classroom activities without disruptions
- Students demonstrating respectful and inclusive behaviours

Staff, students and families all need to work together to make this the great school we know it is!

PINK SHIRT DAY

Pink Shirt Day is about working together to prevent or stop bullying by celebrating people's differences and promoting positive relationships. An annual event, celebrated in many countries around the world, Pink Shirt Day encourages people to talk about bullying and take action against it.


Pink Shirt Day began in Nova Scotia in 2007. A group of students decided to defend a student who was bullied for wearing a pink shirt. In a show of solidarity, many of his peers turned up to school the next day wearing pink shirts, and Pink Shirt Day was born. By wearing a pink shirt, people identify themselves as an ally. The pink shirt is a way of showing those being bullied that there are many people around who care. Please wear pink on that day - it might be a tshirt from another year or just something pink. We need to use our problem solving skills to stop bullying and mean behaviour so wearing pink reminds us to do that every day.

Not all negative behaviours are bullying, however, and we need to aware if the actions are mean behaviours, peer conflict or bullying. It is important to teach and model ways to intervene and speak up - it is important to tell an adult in any situation where a child does not feel safe.



KUB KAR RACES

With changes to the curriculum, educators are finding new ways to engage students in their learning. In particular, educators are teaching Applied Design Skills Technology curriculum. ADST curriculum is an experiential, hands-on program of learning through design and creation that includes a variety of skills and concepts. To facilitate this type of learning, our intermediate divisions are holding a Kub Kar rally on March 11th in our school gym. Kub Kars are toy-racing cars built from kits. Each kit contains a block of pine, plastic wheels and metal axles. The students saw then sand, paint, and add other embellishments for both speed and style. Kars are raced, often three at a time, down a sloped wooden track. Students must problem solve and can demonstrate a great deal of creativity in making their car. This is the first time we have done this and look forward to a great day!
